

Speaker Bios

<u>Sameer Vohra, MD, JD, MA- Director - Illinois Department of Public Health</u> Sameer Vohra, MD, JD, MA, was appointed as the director of the Illinois Department of Public Health, effective August 1, 2022, by Governor JB Pritzker.

Dr. Vohra is a general pediatrician who holds degrees in law and public policy. He is a cross-disciplinary leader in state and national health policy formulation, and his recent focus has been on improving health outcomes in Central and Southern Illinois. Prior to his appointment, Dr. Vohra was the Founding Chair of the Department of Population Science and Policy, a practicing primary care pediatrician, and an Associate Professor of Pediatrics, Public Health, Medical Humanities, and Law at the Southern Illinois University – School of Medicine (SIU-SOM) in Springfield, Illinois, where he also served the State of Illinois as the Interim Chair of the Children's Mental Health Partnership. A graduate of the University of Chicago, where he earned a Master of Arts in public policy, Dr. Vohra completed his medical residency in pediatrics at the University of Chicago. He holds a medical doctorate from SIU-SOM; a juris doctorate from SIU School of Law graduating first in his class; and a Bachelor of Arts in political science and science in human culture with honors from Northwestern University.

Dr. Vohra previously served on the Illinois State Board of Health, the Illinois Medicaid Advisory Committee, the Governor's Rural Affairs Council, the Illinois COVID-19 Response Fund Steering Committee as well as national committees for the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Association of American Medical Colleges, the American Medical Association, and on the Board of Trustees for the Illinois State Medical Society and Chicago Medical Society.

He has received numerous honors including a United States Fulbright Scholarship in 2009, an American Medical Association Foundation's Excellence in Medicine Leadership Award in 2014 and was named an Edgar Fellow in 2016 as one of 40 emerging political and policy leaders in Illinois. In 2020, he was named a Presidential Leadership Scholar, chosen by the George W. Bush Presidential Center, the Clinton Presidential Center, the George and Barbara Bush Foundation, and the LBJ Foundation.

Dr. Vohra resides in Springfield with his wife, Tasnim, and two children.

Dan Wilder is the Vice-President of Operations of the Sorensen, Wilder team, having joined Sorensen, Wilder & Associates after earning his degree in Criminal Justice in 2006.

Dan is the product line leader for the Sorensen, Wilder & Associates Essentials of Aggression Management program, and has provided training in Long Term Care (LTC) facilities across the nation in recognizing and defusing aggressive behavior. Dan has also worked closely with clients to provide ongoing workplace violence and safety training and creating workplace violence programs. In addition, he has also provided Security Vulnerability Assessments for LTC facilities, hospitals, clinics, and physician's practices.

Dan holds a CVI – CSAT certification through the United States Department of Homeland Security. In addition to his role with Sorensen, Wilder & Associates, Dan is also a firefighter / EMT and a fire science instructor. He is also certified in CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) and incorporates CPTED principles into all of the security vulnerability assessments he performs.

Brad Campbell Brad has more than 18 years of experience as a proven leader in Safety and Security. He is a Senior Security Consultant with SWA and has performed Security Vulnerability Assessments, policy reviews and taught Active Shooter and Aggression Management classes all over the United States. During his career, Brad has served as a correctional officer, hospital Security Manager, Environment of Care Committee Chairperson, Hospital Safety Officer, and Emergency Preparedness Coordinator. He graduated from Indiana State University in 2020 with a Master of Science in Occupational Safety Management.

Brad has served in various command and general staff positions during more than twenty exercises and real-world events. He works closely with local, state, and federal agencies and other community partners to conduct planning and emergency response activities. Brad is certified in security management, environment of care/life safety, and emergency management. He specializes in policy development, risk assessments, security vulnerability analysis, and hazard vulnerability analysis. He is a leader in the implementation of healthcare safety programs including workplace violence prevention, active shooter response, and verbal de-escalation training. **Brent Van Ham, MS, RN, CDC, CADC,** holds a master's degree from Southern Illinois University in Rehabilitation Counseling and is a Certified Rehabilitation Counselor specializing in substance disorder prevention, treatment, and recovery. He is also a Registered Nurse with many years of experience in multiple clinical settings.

Throughout her time, she has served on multiple tornado deployments and has been on the ground of natural disasters as an emergency responder, as well. Jennifer has seen natural disaster response from a multitude of perspectives and has seen first-hand the power of all disciplines working together.

Scott Gauvin, IPEM, NEMEA Scott Gauvin serves the state of Illinois and the Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Office of Homeland Security as the Manager of Strategic Operations and Preparedness. Mr. Gauvin's career spans over twenty years in the emergency management field of practice. During this time, he has served as the Manager of the Illinois SEOC, working with Federal and International emergency management programs to adopt the Emergency Management Standard. Mr. Gauvin has managed numerous state and federal disasters and been deployed out of state to respond as well. Mr. Gauvin holds an IPEM certification from the state of Illinois and is a proud graduate of the FEMA National Emergency Management Executive Academy.

<u>Christine Wielgos</u> Christine Wielgos is the Warning Coordination Meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Paducah KY. She received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Meteorology from Northern Illinois University. She has worked with the National Weather Service in Paducah KY since March 2000. As Warning Coordination Meteorologist, Christine's responsibilities include ensuring consistency and integrity of National Weather Service products and services, conducting safety and preparedness programs throughout the area, leading education and training courses for partners and the public, as well as occasionally working the forecast and warning operations desks.

Tony Collings is the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) Region 5 Cybersecurity State Coordinator (CSC) for Illinois. CISA protects the Nation's critical infrastructure from cyber and physical threats by working with partners to defend against today's threats and collaborating to build more secure and resilient infrastructure for the future. Tony brings 38 years of information technology experience to the CSC position including seven years of cybersecurity experience. Prior to joining CISA, Tony served the state of Illinois as a Deputy Chief Information Security Officer at the Department of Innovation and Technology (DOIT), where he played a key role in the development and maturation of the state's cybersecurity program. Tony has worked for state government for much of his career, including positions at Central Management Services, Illinois State Police, Illinois Department of Corrections, and the Administrative Office of Illinois Courts. Tony has also worked in the energy sector of critical infrastructure.

Tony earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Eastern Illinois University, majoring in Computer Management. A lifetime learner, he has obtained several certifications in Cybersecurity, Cloud Security, Privacy, and Project Management. Tony resides in Springfield, Illinois.

Bart Hagston has been with Jackson County Health Department for 24 years, working in the environmental health & emergency preparedness arena. He has served as Administrator since 2019. He served as the Department's Planning Section Chief for the year leading up to the 2017 eclipse, then served as the Incident Commander in the operational periods around the event.

<u>Tom Windland</u> currently serves as the 911 Director in Wayne County. Tom is an active EMT, and teaches various public safety courses through the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges.

Robert D. Hyman, MS, CCEMT-P, PNCCT,NRP Robert has been a nationally registered paramedic since 1994 and has served as the EMS System Coordinator for the Good Samaritan Regional EMS System since 2003. He holds a MS degree in Biosecurity and Disaster Preparedness from Saint Louis University. He is also the program director and paramedic instructor for Rend Lake College.

Bruce Tally began his career on the family farm. In 1957, he began volunteer work for Williamson County EMA, later specializing in under water rescue/recovery, and in 1967 started as a volunteer FF and emergency response person for Carterville. He and another became the first EMTs in Carterville. He earned a BS degree at SIU, and then became a power lineman in Vietnam. He joined Central Illinois Public Service as a Distribution Engineer, later becoming the Metering Engineer for Ameren Illinois. Near the end of his 33 year tenure with Ameren, he then became Fire Chief for Carterville, with intention of fully retiring within a year. Unfortunately a terrible event happened on September 11, 2001. The fire service quickly moved to terrorism, and othe one year of intended duty became 15. Several years later, Bruce rejoined Ameren for a special detail. Simultaneous occupations included Haz Mat Mitigation for a private company and nationwide teaching of grounding, bonding, and communication line protection. Bruce also rode his mountain bicycle solo, across America, arriving in Laguna Beach, California on his 70th birthday.
